Philippe and his older brother Jacques associated with Pilgrims of Leiden and grew up under the teachings and influence of the English Separatists Church. It is believed that Philippe was with the Pilgrims when they left Holland for Southhampton, England, in the SPEED-WELL, where they joined the MAYFLOWER group. It is possible Philippe was on the SPEEDWELL when she left England in company with the MAYFLOWER, but he would have returned to England when the SPEEDWELL proved unseaworthy. The nineteen-year old Philippe was one of the thirty-five passengers on the FORTUNE when it arrived in Plymouth in 1621.

Philippe spent his first years in the Plymouth Colony under the roof of his uncle Francis Cooke and aunt Hester Mahieu Cooke. In 1623 he received a one acre land grant near Plymouth which he sold in 1627. In 1632 or 33 he moved to Duxbury and in 1634 he married Hester Dewsbury. They eventually had eight children--all born in Duxbury. In 1637 Philippe volunteered for the War against the Pequot Indians who had massacred a number of colonists in Connecticut. For his services he was granted forty acres of land near the property of John and Priscilla Alden. Duxbury High School is situated on this acreage today.

Philippe continued to work as a surveyor and helped lay out some of the original roads in the Plymouth Colony. He also continued to acquire additional land. In 1645, he was granted land in Bridgewater, 15 miles west of Plymouth. In 1652 he and thirty-six other colonists purchased property from the Indians near the present cities of New Bedford and Fairhaven, Massachusetts. Sometime before 1657 Hester Dewsbury died and during that year

Sometime before 1657 Hester Dewsbury died and during that year Philippe married Mary Pontus Glass, the widow of James Glass. It was with Mary that Philippe has his ninth and last child, Samuel.

According to one historian, Philippe moved to Bridgewater where he died in 1681. Some Delanos believed he died in Duxbury that year. At any rate Philippe DE LA NOYE (which was then spelled Delanoy and was destined to become Delano by the end of the next generation) established the family of nine branches which has spread to many countries.

These branches (based on his children) are as follows:

- 5. John Delano (b?) (d?) md (?) Mary Weston.
- 6. Jane Delano (b 1646?) (d ? unmarried).
- 7. <u>Lt. Johnathan Delano</u> (b 1647) (d 1720) md (1678) Mercy Warren.
- <u>Rebecca Delano</u> (b 1651?) (d before 1715) md John Churchill.
 <u>Samuel Delano</u> (b 1659) (d1728) (md 1682-3?) Elizabeth Standish.

Ed. note: In the following issues of the Newsletter, it is planned to provide an outline of one of the branches through a generation. It should also be noted that the data on which these outlines are based come chiefly from the GHAAHD which does have errors and will only have extended genealogies of Philippe's sons. The name DELANO as it is frequently spelled in the Americas was originally spelled de Lannoy. As you will recall, Philippe DE LA NOYE's father Jean spelled his last name de Lannoy. According to the GHAAHD, the name comes from the small town of Lannoy a few miles east of Lille in northern France close to the Belgian border. Little is known about this town which appears on an ancient map of Flanders (Flandria) in A.D. 863 as Alnetum which was also spelled as L'Annois, L'Annoe, L Aulnais and L'Aulnoy. This portion of Flanders, after being under the control of many countries, has been part of France since 1667.

Lannoy is given as the title of a countship (Comte) in Flanders. The first lord of Lannoy mentioned is Hughes de Lannoy spoken of as a Knight at the Tournoi (tournament) de Anchin in 1096. Book One of the GHAAHD provides documentation linking Philippe's father, Jean de Lannoy, with the Counts of Lannoy as well as other lines.

The surname of de Lannoy or De La Noye has undergone many changes. Philippe De La Noye and sons gradually left off the "ye" and wrote it Delano, often changed by ignorant recording clerks to Dillanoe, Dillnoe, Dilnow, Dillino, etc. Later, during the early 1800's, some families placed a capital L in the name. DELANO is pronounced "Dell-uh-no" particularly in the northeastern U.S. while many elsewhere pronounce it Delāno. Variations in pronunciation are found throughout the U.S. and Canada.

OFFICIAL GENEALOGICAL REFERENCE ADOPTED BY THE DELANO KINDRED BOARD

The Genealogy, History, and Alliances of the American House of Delano 1621 to 1899 (New York, 1899) compiled by Major Joel Andrew Delano and Arranged by Mortimer Delano de Lannoy (referred to by the acronym GHAAHD) is the most comprehensive Delano family history known to officers and directors of the DELANO KINDRED. Although known to have "a large number of errors" and a somewhat "awkward manner of presentation," its 561 pages of information, which include a detailed general index, have proved to be a valuable source for determining lineage of a DELANO surnamed, descendent/ancestor born before 1895 to 1899. For example, if one is able to find two or three ancestors through use of the GHAAHD index, together with their birth and death dates and residences, the genealogical descent lineage back to Philippe DE LA NOYE can usually be established.

The GHAAHD contains a history and heraldry of the Maison de Franchimont and de Lannoy from 1096 to 1621 as well as some details of the DELANO de LANNOY coat-of-arms including the motto "Bonnes Nouvelles."

Because of its comprehensive documentation, the DELANO KINDRED board has adopted the GHAAHD as the major genealogical source for this Society, notwithstanding its errors and arrangement.

There were only 400 original copies of the GHAAHD printed in 1899. However, Higginson Books, Derby Square, Salem, MA01970, phone (508)745-7170, has good copies of the original with illustrations. The winter sale price of the GHAAHD is \$50.00 (US) plus postage--a savings of 30% under the catalogue price. We talked with "Larry" who said, if you mention the DELANO KINDRED News Letter, Higginson Books will make the \$50.00 price available to you after the sale ends. The normal contact at Higginson is Emily Wheeldon who is at their office Tuesday-Friday.

GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION BOARD

Although we do not yet have volunteers to handle genealogical queries, we will, on a space available basis, print queries on a first-come first-serve basis for members. As many of you know, there are many genealogical information services. One that strikes a sympathetic chord is "The Second Boat" P.O. Box 398, Machias, ME 04654 (\$20.00 U.S. for 6 issues). As you know, Philippe DE LA NOYE arrived on the FORTUNE which was the "second boat" to the Plymouth Colony. The "Second Boat" claims to be one of the ten largest genealogical magazines in the U.S. and is devoted to Colonial families reaching American shores in 1600's and their descendants down to the Revolutionary era.

MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

The Society has had difficulty in initially organizing its membership procedures. We are hopeful that we have them well in hand now. You will note a membership form is provided for your use in this newsletter.

In accordance with the Bylaws of the Society, classes of membership include: Descendant Members (descendants 18 years or older and their husband or wife), Non-Voting Descendant member (any descendant under 18 years of age), Associate Member (non-descendant--persons who are interested in furthering the purposes of the Society), and Honorary Members (persons whose nomination is approved by the Board). In addition, Descendent Members have the right to make motions and vote on all business transacted at all meetings.

For the calendar year 1992, the Society has not required any proof of descent from PHILIPPE DE LA NOYE. Once a Membership Genealogist has been appointed, proof of descent will be required for Descendent Membership. For the purpose of proving descent from PHILIPPE DE LA NOYE, it is the policy of the Board of Directors of Society to accept the genealogical lineage listed in the GHAAHD as compiled by Major Joel A. Delano with any future updates or corrections thereto as adequate proof. Accordingly acceptably referenced documentation proving descent to one of the genealogical lines in the GHAAHD should acceptably prove descendance from PHILIPPE DE LA NOYE

1992 REUNION OF THE DELANO KINDRED

The 1992 Reunion of the DELANO KINDRED is scheduled to be held within the period of Wednesday, July 29 through Saturday, August 1, 1992, in Duxbury, Massachusetts. Tentative plans include at least two days for registration and for self-guided tours of Duxbury, Plymouth, and nearby areas of DELANO significance. 1991 FAMILY BRANCH & REGIONAL REUNIONS
