The Delano Family and Artificial Intelligence Tom Delano

Several weeks ago, I was "playing" with ChatGPT, and after I became somewhat familiar with the software app, I decided to ask it a different question. I asked it to tell me about the "Delano Family history."

I have pasted what came back from ChatGPT below. It is reasonably accurate, although not 100%, and **it is very complimentary about the Delano Family**. Of course, we don't know where ChatGPT found this Delano family information. Enjoy!

The Delano family of Massachusetts is a distinguished American lineage with roots tracing back to the early colonial period. The family name, originally spelled "de Lannoy," reflects its Flemish origins. The progenitor of the American Delano family, Philippe de Lannoy, was born in Leiden, Holland, in 1602 to a family of Walloon Protestant refugees who had fled religious persecution in the Spanish Netherlands (modern-day Belgium).

Philippe sailed to the New World aboard the *Fortune* in 1621, just a year after the Mayflower. He joined the Plymouth Colony in what is now Massachusetts, a settlement founded by English Separatists. Over time, his surname was anglicized to "Delano." Philippe became a respected figure in the colony, contributing to its early growth and establishing a lasting legacy. He married Hester Dewsbury and later Mary Pontus Glass, and had numerous children, ensuring the family's growth in the region.

The Delano family spread across southeastern Massachusetts, particularly in the towns of Duxbury and Dartmouth. They became landowners, farmers, and later merchants and sea captains as New England's maritime economy developed. By the 18th and 19th centuries, various Delano descendants had become influential in commerce, shipbuilding, and civic affairs.

One of the most prominent branches of the family emerged in New Bedford, a hub of the American whaling industry. Warren Delano Sr., a successful merchant, made his fortune in the China trade during the early 19th century. His son, Warren Delano Jr., continued in international trade and spent time in China as a tea and opium trader. His wealth played a key role in supporting his family during hard times, including during the financial panic of 1857.

Perhaps the most famous Delano descendant is Franklin Delano Roosevelt, 32nd President of the United States. His mother, Sara Delano, was the daughter of Warren Delano Jr., linking the Delanos directly to American presidential history. The family's strong traditions of education, public service, and civic responsibility are evident in FDR's legacy and in the continued prominence of the Delano name. Throughout the centuries, the Delano family maintained a presence in Massachusetts while also spreading to other parts of the United States. Their story is a classic example of early immigrant success in colonial America, marked by adaptation, enterprise, and enduring influence. The Delanos contributed not only to the economic and political life of Massachusetts but also to the broader narrative of American history.

Today, the Delano family is remembered both for its historical importance and for its contributions to American society through generations of leadership, public service, and entrepreneurial spirit.

Last month, I shared more than a few words about my grandfather, but this month, I wanted to say something about my uncle. I am also going to include his daughter's words for another insight into this wonderful human.

My Uncle Rick, as we called him, was quite the character. He and my mom were always close, and they were a lot alike in some ways. His humor was special and even more so when around my mom. Rick was an amazing uncle, and he allowed my brother and me to get away with things, took us to cool places, allowed us to swim in his pool, and was always supportive of any venture we were making. He taught us life skills, taught us about art, taught us about engineering, and taught us so much about life in many ways. I still can't believe it's real, losing him and my grandfather, so I think my words are lacking these days.

Here is what my incredible maternal first cousin, Ava Delano Abbott of Normal, IL, wanted to share about her dad. She says it well, thanks for the words and the thoughts, Ava.

My Dad, Richard Dorman Delano, with his engineer mind, was someone who could fix anything and never gave up on a problem. Unfortunately, he could not fix the cancer that took him from us. That did not stop him from believing he would overcome. He had a determination when he wanted to do something, where nothing would hold him back. Whatever he did was done with out-of-the-box creativity and beauty, but when he got it done was another matter. Dad had his own time he lived by. I remember my

Grandma, his mom, saying "You'll be late to your own funeral!". He was a rehab engineer, an artist, a wood carver, a marble sculptor, a gardener, a fisherman, a carpenter, a roofer, and could fix plumbing and electrical problems. He was a skilled outdoorsman. He could play any instrument, guitar, bass, mandolin, and my favorite throughout my whole life was his banjo picking, which he would frequently play Foggy Mountain Breakdown. I know there was more; he was a man of many interests and skills, but to me he was Dad. I got from him my sense of humor, which never fails me and gets me through all the toughest times in my life. I never had to explain my silliness to my Dad, he just got it and would go along without stopping me to explain I wasn't making sense. We were always filled with quirky humor, whether it was just joking around, watching bad sci-fi movies, or celebrating Groundhog Day as the most prominent holiday of the year. I learned a strength from my Dad as I watched him go through many hurdles in life. I watched him never give up, try, try again until you succeeded. Many in similar shoes do not make it, but his honesty about his struggles in life helped shape me into the person I am today. He was a gentle and patient man full of love and a passion for life. He was a proud Grandpa to his grandsons and was so happy to meet his first great-granddaughter. I am proud when I look in the mirror and I see the echoes of my father staring back at me. Whenever I drive back home to Virginia and I reach the mountains, I feel the energy of my father and my grandfather coming from the land, the rocks, and the soil. I feel them in the rivers and the ocean. I will forever be grateful to the Delano men who helped shape me and my family into who we are today, and I will never stop missing them as I carry them inside my heart. I wish that I could return to the days when we would be out on the sailboat with the sun shining on our faces, returning to check the crab pots, laughing and having a good time. Love you Dad.
