Only four married women survived the first winter in Plymouth (1620-1621) Elizabeth Hopkins, Eleanor Billington, Susannah White Winslow, & Mary Brewster. These four women single handedly oversaw the food preparations for the 3-day harvest feast for the 50 colonists & Massasoit & his 90 men – the feast that became known as the first "Thanksgiving."

The Pilgrims did not eat pumpkin pie & cranberry sauce at the first Thanksgiving. They did eat roast wild fowl (such as duck, goose, & turkey), corn meal, cod, sea bass & venison brought by the Indians.

#### **CORRECTIONS TO THE SEPT.-OCT. BONNES NOUVELLES**

After reviewing the Sept.-Oct. *Bonnes Nouvelles* we noticed a few discrepancies. On page 2, we hasten to note that the Evergreen Cemetery is only <u>3</u> miles west of the DeLano Homestead, <u>not 300</u> miles which would place it about 30 miles northeast of Waterloo, Iowa. Also on page 2, with respect to the "death's door" on the front porch of the Homestead, the caskets of William DeLano's first wife Louisa Skinner DeLano and their son Herman who died of Typhoid fever in 1874 would have been carried through that door.

On page 12, we also erred on the address of our Treasurer, Robert C. DeLano. Bob and his lovely wife Debra

moved to Charlotte, NC some time ago. His correct address is: Mr. Robert C. DeLano, 1321 Land Grant Road, Charlotte, NC 28217. His phone number is (704) 527-0877. Sorry about that Bob. We hope these corrections will clear up any confusion that may have occurred. We thank cousin Verna Fenwick for bringing some of these errors to our attention.

# NEEDLEWORK SAMPLERS AS A GENEALOGICAL SOURCE

i

N eedlework samplers have long been a means where a young lady could demonstrate her skill in embroidery. Older samplers have been handed down, usually through a daughter's descendant line as a family heirloom. In fact, these samplers were collected as antiques by many. Frequently, the design of the sampler includes the embroiderer's family tree--the birth and marriage dates of the parents and the birth dates of their children. In this case, the needlework sampler can also be a good genealogical reference source.

Muriel Cushing forwarded to us information sent to her by cousin Phyllis Kettler of Riverside, California about a sampler made by her DELANO descendant, Hannah DELANO Small (GHAAHD pg. 182), who is in the Dr. Thomas Delano Branch. Phyllis included a photograph of Hannah's sampler she completed in 1822 when she was eight years old.

Muriel has included the genealogical information which has been corrected and updated using Hannah's sampler as source [7] (see underlined data). Hannah later married sea captain James Stevens. Muriel has provided a fan chart of Hannah DELANO Small Stevens, which we have included on an accompanying page with photographs of Hannah and her husband James. We thank cousin Phyllis Kettler for providing us the information and photographs.

### **CONCERNS FOR OUR FUTURE**

At an "Ad Hoc" meeting of the DELANO Kindred, Board members (George DeLano, Ed Delano and Frank Delano) present at the Kalamazoo Reunion, concerns about the future of the DELANO Kindred were discussed. These concerns, best expressed in a letter by Director Frank Delano to the President, were forwarded to all Board members. Parts of his letter are excerpted below.

We seem to be on a plateau with respect to membership "over these years, we have lost about as many members as we have gained in new members. Our income is minimal and insufficient to support important potential projects." We need to clarify our vision of the Society's future. "Have we so carefully targeted our family's history, genealogy and past that we have overlooked our concomitant need to imagine and invent the future of our organization?" Although the DELANO Kindred is organized exclusively for educational and charitable purposes, we know that it's purposes also serve our children by providing them their family's history and genealogy. "What greater service could we offer them than to insure that some future generation does not have to reinvent the organization?

However, I sense and share a sense of clarity and purpose about the future of the DELANO Kindred. My own, albeit cloudy, sense of our cause is to use our genealogical and historical interests and resources to promote a continuing sense of connected family among our many disparate and far-flung relations. I am sure others have different concepts, but I believe it is essential to our future for us to focus our dream for the DELANO Kindred into a vision that will carry us forward as a successful family organization."

Ed, Frank and George talked about many things which have been divided into four general categories outlined below:

B.

- I. <u>Program Development</u> Making membership in the DELANO KINDRED attractive.
  - A. Facilitating and encouraging communication among members.
    - 1. Annually publish a DELANO KINDRED Directory of Members so that we can know, contact and visit each other.

 Other programs to encourage contact with people, which may help to stimulate our genealogical work and help locate and reach missing cousins.

 Expand/redesign the coverage of the Bonnes Nouvelles to include regional news of members--from regional correspondents, etc.

C. Entering the Information Highway. Many of us have computers, especially those of us actively involved in genealogical research. The computer also serves as a way of contacting people. The full capability of this capability should be explored and utilized to the Society's advantage.

D. We need to foster a sense of history, family origins, ancestral places and paths. For example, the DELANO history of Duxbury and other places (cemeteries, cities, houses) should be developed and as feasible placed on video. Perhaps we could establish a "Registry of Historic DELANO Places."

E. With all of this, we must be prepared to assemble this information in a "library" of information which can be available to our members.

#### Membership Development

II.

A. Whatever the shape of the program eventually takes, we need a plan for "marketing" the DELANO KINDRED. At a minimum, we need

a brochure to send to prospective members advising them of costs and benefits. Other possibilities include membership and other appropriate certificates--suitable for framing.

- Creation of Local Chapters. In the founding of the KINDRED, consideration was given to eventually creating local or regional chapters. This would be a means of getting family members together for socializing, as well as work, and could lead to the identification of "lost" cousins and prospective members, as well as many other things that would foster the aims of the Society.
- III. <u>Financial Planning</u>. As our program develops, we must be prepared to increase our membership dues. At present, our dues barely meet our austere Operating Budget. We must be prepared to increase our membership dues to reasonably meet our program goals. We must also pursue a tax-exempt designation with the IRS so that we can encourage tax deductible donations.
- IV. Leadership Development. Any program that develops and grows cannot be undertaken by a few people. We need lots of help from people within the family from different fields: law, accounting, financial advisers, public relations, graphic artists, computer operators and programmers, genealogists, historians, travel agents and publishers to name a few. We must be able to identify future leaders to carry on.

These were some of our thoughts. It was with these thoughts in mind that your President asked Frank Delano to organize an "Ad Hoc" meeting of members this fall. The outgrowth of this initiative was the meeting at Stratford, Virginia in November 1995.

#### THE STRATFORD VIRGINIA MEETING

As most of you recall, Frank Delano sent a letter to the membership on 12 October inviting one and all to Stratford Hall Plantation on Friday evening the 17th of November through Sunday the 19th. Those of you who couldn't attend were asked to send us your ideas about the Kindred's future.

We thank the twenty-seven plus members who responded to the letter. The many suggestions sent enclosed in the responses were greatly appreciated. Those attending besides our host Frank P. Delano were Frank W. and Kitty Delano, from McLean, VA, Meggan Delano, from Manassas, VA, Robert and Jean Howard from Glen Allen, VA, Robert and Martha Delano from Warsaw, VA, Virginia Kelly from Kilmarnock, VA, Anne and Cecil Bromley from Lancaster, VA, and George DeLano from Virginia Beach. The group congregated in the Astor Guest House at Stratford Plantation. After dinner in the nearby Dining Room, we began discussions and reviewed the letters with a crackling fire in the fireplace. On Saturday morning, the early riser in the group proved to be our host Frank P., who created a delicious Northern Neck Virginia brunch. More discussions followed. In the afternoon, the group toured Stratford Plantation Hall--the home of the Lees and the birthplace of Robert E. Lee. Costumed docents guided the tour groups through the great house and some of the out-buildings, which included a working kitchen. Cousin Martha Delano was one of the docents on duty during our tour. After more

discussions, we drove into the town of Montross for dinner, then back to the Astor House for more discussions. Sunday morning after coffee, the early risers hiked up to the Lee mill, which is still in working condition near the shore of the Potomac River. On returning, Frank P. created a Northern Neck Pancake Breakfast, which was truly out of this world. Meggan Delano was awarded the meeting's DELANO Pancake Award for consuming the most pancakes.

The initial results of the meeting included the following:

Jean Howard and Frank P. Delano will 1 investigate establishing a DELANO "Home Page" on the internet or other data system in an effort to get the DELANO KINDRED on to the "Information Highway."

Distribute an annual directory of members as 2. soon as possible. Frank P. and George took action on this important item and it has resulted in a directory enclosed in this issue of the Bonnes Nouvelles.

Ed Delano is continuing to develop the DELANO KINDRED regional contact network through "Operation Network"--see NL#16.

Other initiatives are beginning, and with your 4 cooperation will bear fruit.

# THE "GHAAHD" THE OFFICIAL GENEALOGICAL REFERENCE ADOPTED BY THE DELANO KINDRED BOARD

From time to time, we receive queries on how to obtain a copy of the GHAAHD, which is the official genealogical reference adopted by the DELANO Kindred Board. *The Genealogy, History, and Alliances of the American House of Delano 1621 to 1899* (New York, 1989) compiled by Major Joel Andrew Delano and arranged by Mortimer Delano de Lannoy (referred to by the acronym GHAAHD) is the most comprehensive Delano family history known to officers and directors of the DELANO KINDRED. Although known to have "a large number of errors" and a somewhat "awkward manner of presentation," its 561 pages of information, which include a detailed general index, have proved to be a valuable source for determining lineage of a DELANO surnamed, descendant/ancestor born before 1895 to 1899.

The GHAAHD contains a history and heraldry of the Maison de Franchimont and de Lannoy from 476 to 1621 as well

as some details of the DELANO de LANNOY coat-of-arms including the motto "Bonnes Nouvelles."

Because of its comprehensive documentation, the DELANO KINDRED Board has adopted the GHAAHD as the major genealogical source for this Society, notwithstanding its errors and arrangement.
